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PROLOGUE

The Thirty-fifth Annual Mountain Interstate Foreign Language Conference was hosted by Furman University, and was held October 3-5, 1985, in Greenville, South Carolina. This regional conference was the best attended of our conferences, and attracted more than 400 people from 36 states and several foreign countries, with some 391 registered participants. There were one hundred ninety-two academic institutions represented at the conference. Scholarly papers were presented on a number of national literatures, including French, German, Italian, Luso-Brazilian, Portuguese, Russian, and Spanish. Other papers dealt with pedagogy, linguistics, literary criticism, literature and the arts, comparative literature, Classics, stylistics, and translation. The program had several «plenary sessions» in French, German, Portuguese, and Spanish Peninsular, as well as Latin American literature. The address of our keynote speaker, Dr. Jonathan Culler of Cornell University, to the general session was, of course, a high point of the Convention and we are pleased to include his remarks in this collection.

As the President of the Mountain Interstate Foreign Language Conference (MIFLC) at the time of the conference, I would like to thank all of you who served as readers for the conference, my colleagues at Furman, who contributed directly or indirectly to the success of this conference, and all the members of the Editorial Advisory Board for their help in the difficult task of selecting so few from among so many excellent papers to be included in *Selected Proceedings* of the 35th Annual Mountain Interstate Foreign Language Conference, an edition of some forty outstanding articles read at the

Greenville conference. My thanks as well to Professor Oscar Hernández Daniel, Jean-Pierre Piriou, Daniel Reedy, Helene M. Riley, Alexandrino E. Severino, and Joseph T. Snow for organizing the plenary sessions, and to Amelia del Castillo and Hilda Perea for reading selections of their work in the special evening session in Spanish.

I offer very special thanks to the Vice-President of Academic Affairs and Dean of Furman University, Dr. John H. Crabtree, Jr., for his support of this conference and the publication of these proceedings.
